# **Notice of Nomination Meeting**

Notice is hereby given that a meeting of the electors of the Henvey Inlet First Nation will be held at the Henvey Inlet Fire Hall on Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> day of February, 2023, beginning at 5:00 o'clock p.m. and lasting for at least three hours to conclude at 8:00 o'clock p.m. for the purpose of nominating candidates for the positions of Chief and Councillors on the Band Council of said Band, for the next ensuing term.

There are seven (7) Councillor positions and one (1) position for Chief available.

The election will be held at the Henvey Inlet Fire Hall on Thursday the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of March, 2023 from 9:00 o'clock a.m. until 8:00 o'clock p.m.

Please note that any eligible voter may nominate candidates by using a mail-in nomination form. All eligible voters, regardless of residence, that are 18 years of age or older as of the nomination meeting may nominate candidates for the position of both Chief and Councillor. Voters may deliver or mail-in a written nomination and a completed, signed and witnessed voter declaration form to the Electoral Officer before the time set for the nomination meeting OR voters may nominate candidates orally at the nomination meeting. Mailed nominations not received by the Electoral Officer before the time set for nomination meeting are void.

Voting will be done by mail-in ballot or in-person voting on Election Day.

Covid 19 protocols may be in effect at the Nomination Meeting and the Polling Station during vote day.

This position requires excellent interpersonal communication skills and the ability to adapt and respond to all childcare needs.

### **POSITION SUMMARY**

Henvey Inlet First Nation is seeking a full-time **Housing and Finance Assistant** to join our Administration. The Housing and Finance Assistant reports to the Director of Finance/Administration and is responsible for coordinating preventative maintenance for all Band-owned housing units and supervising all housing maintenance and repairs. The Housing and Finance Assistant receives and reviews all housing applications and inquiries, and, in collaboration with the Housing Committee, recommends tenants to Chief and Council for vacant units in accordance with the rules and regulations set forth in the Housing Policy. Additionally, the Housing and Finance Assistant is responsible for all administrative management of the Housing Department including collecting rent, issuing receipts and invoices, completing housing reports, facilitating workshops and processing payments for all incoming department invoices. The Housing and Finance Assistant will also support the Finance Department with maintaining housing and financial budgets, reports and books, and processing accounts payables, receivables and payroll as assigned. This position requires strong organization skills, financial literacy and professionalism.

### MAIN RESPONSIBILITIES

The Housing and Finance Assistant will be responsible to:

### **Housing Support**

- Aid in the preparation and monitoring of the annual housing budget and work plan
- Conduct analyses of maintenance and repair costs to determine areas where cost reductions can be implemented
- Conduct routine and annual home, building, equipment and grounds inspections of band-owned units to determine necessity of repairs and maintenance
- Ensure building facilities are compliant with health and safety regulations including local fire codes, accessibility and other relevant building and maintenance legislation
- Plan, coordinate and schedule preventative maintenance, major repairs, remodeling and construction projects on housing units within the community
- Request quotes and negotiate contracts and service agreements with trade professionals, third party suppliers or service providers
- Arrange the purchase and delivery of project materials as required by trade professionals or service providers
- Coordinate grounds maintenance including landscaping and snow removal in collaboration with the Maintenance Department
- Provide a positive and professional image of the organization at all times, serving as the department's point of contact for all housing-related inquiries
- · Act as a liaison between membership, the Housing Committee, vendors, external organizations and Chief and Council
- · Receive and review all housing applications and inquiries and respond in a professional and timely manner
- · Prepare housing and tenancy agreements, ensuring they are accurately completed, signed and filed
- Prepare and circulate newsletter updates, correspondence and related documentation accordingly
- Meet with prospective tenants to show properties, explain terms of occupancy and provide information about housing policies and procedures
- Coordinate and facilitate two home maintenance workshops annually as part of the Housing Incentive Program
- Study housing demands, occupancy and turnover rates, and accommodation requirements of applicants to recommend policy and physical requirement changes
- Solicit and utilize tenant's opinions on a variety of issues, ensuring they feel involved and as though they have influence on decisions
- Aid in the creation and administration of programs that will increase tenant involvement in various decisions concerning the housing authority

- Maintain a database of all community members living in Band housing
- · Promote harmonious relations among tenants, housing project personnel, and persons of the community
- · Investigate complaints, disturbances and violations and resolve problems following company rules, regulation and policies
- Attend and facilitate monthly Housing Committee meetings, recording meeting minutes and actioning meeting objectives
- Research, interpret and maintain by-laws, legislation and building/safety codes, making recommendations for changes to the appropriate party as needed
- Assist with revisions and updates to the Housing Policy in coordination with the community, staff, Housing Committee and Chief and Council
- · Collect rental fees and issue receipts to tenants
- · Process payment of incoming bills for the Housing Department including mortgage, insurance, utilities, etc.
- · Maintain updated and accurate financial records, preparing operational budget reports for the Director of Finance
- · Develop operational progress and informational reports for membership and Chief and Council as requested
- Perform a variety of office administration tasks including but not limited to filing, copying, printing, scanning, emailing, and answering phones

# **POSITION SUMMARY**

Henvey Inlet First Nation is seeking a **Secondary School Bus Driver** to join our Administration for a temporary, short-term contract up to six months. The Secondary School Bus Driver reports to the Education Counsellor and is responsible for transporting students of various ages to and from their homes and respective schools in a timely and safe manner and in accordance with MTO driving regulations, Ontario traffic laws and safe driving practices. This position requires excellent organization, communication and customer service skills.

# MAIN RESPONSIBILITIES

The Secondary School Bus Driver will be responsible to:

- Ensure bus is well-maintained and operational by conducting daily safety checks on both interior and exterior of school bus prior to operating vehicle
- · Report any bus malfunctions or needed repairs
- Safely deliver students to and from their homes and schools, following the assigned time schedule.
- Assist students with boarding and exiting the bus and while crossing the street as needed
- Adhere to and enforce bus safety rules and standards
- Comply with traffic regulations to operate vehicles in a safe and courteous manner
- Resolve any conflicts in a positive, respectful and proactive manner
- Complete an Ontario School Bus Inspection Log Book and Drivers Time Log Book on a daily basis
- Fuel the bus at HIFN Gas Bar as required, notifying the Gas Bar Attendant which bus they are fueling to ensure the correct account is charged

- Cleaning of the interior of the bus daily and restocking bus supplies when necessary

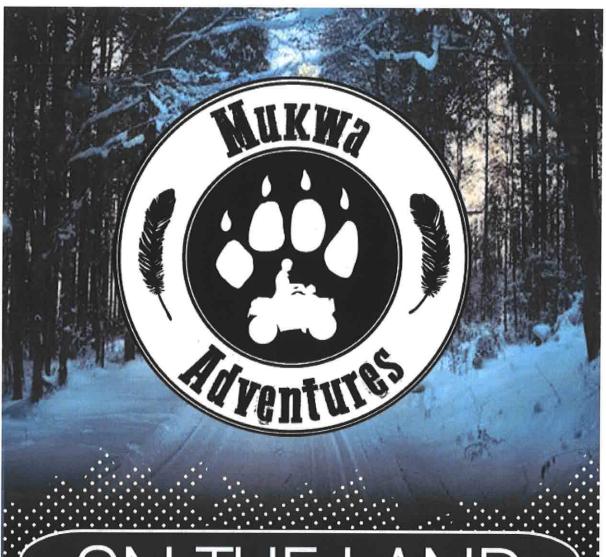

# Kinawiiyah

Kinawiiyah is held every Tuesday afternoon at Britt Public School. The Staff and Students gather in the gym to participate in Anishnaabe teachings and cultural sharing. We have had Elders, Story Tellers and Knowledge Keepers come to the school to share with us. They share about Drumming, Teas, Medicines, Storytelling, Medicine Wheel, Seven Grandfather's and Dream Catchers to name a few.

On December 06, 2022 we divided the children into four groups of mixed-grades. Each group had a Staff helper. The children were given very large Medicine Wheels. The children were asked to fill in each direction Mental, Physical, Emotional and Spiritual with words that we can do in each of the four directions to keep us balanced. Time permitting the children were able to at least fill in two directions. I captured what they wrote for each direction and compiled in a hand out to Staff, Students and the News Letters for Henvey Inlet First Nation, Magnetawan First Nation and Britt Public School.

On December 13, 2022 Carol Stevens from Magnetawan First Nation had Storyteller Mary Fraser come and share with the children. Mary shared that there was not enough snow on the ground to share her story. She did however share about her father and where she grew up on Manitoulin Island in Anishnaabemowin and translated to English. Mary asked if anyone recognized any words in the language and many students did know many of the words.

Next week is our last Kinawiiyah for 2022. A new Kinawiiyah schedule will be shared soon for the second half of the school year 2023. If there is anyone in the area of Britt Public School that can share teachings and cultural knowledge with our students, please contact any of the following people and we will get in contact with you.

# New pharmacy benefit listings

Check the drug benefit list to find all eligible products and criteria for coverage

- Neomycin compounded capsules are now covered as an open benefit without prior approval. This medication is an antibiotic used to treat skin infections
- The following new listings are covered as limited use benefits with prior approval:
  - Vascepa (icosapent ethyl) to reduce the risk of cardiovascular events for patients also taking medication for high cholesterol
  - MAR-Trientine (trientine hydrochloride) used for the treatment of Wilson's disease for patients who are intolerant to penicillamine
  - Kynmobi (apomorphine) sublingual film tablets for the acute, intermittent treatment of patients with Parkinson's disease
  - Eylea (aflibercept) prefilled syringe for the treatment of some types of macular degeneration and diabetic eye disease
  - Onureg (azacitidine) tablets for the treatment of adult patients with acute myeloid leukemia (AML)
  - Inrebic (fedratinib) for treatment of an enlarged spleen, and disease-related symptoms for adult patients with some types of cancer
  - Trikafta (elexacaftor-tezacaftor-ivacaftor) for the treatment of cystic fibrosis in patients aged 6 years and older
  - o Erivedge (vismodegib) for the treatment of certain skin cancers
  - Breztri Aerosphere (budesonide/glycopyrronium/formoterol fumarate), an inhaler for the treatment of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), including chronic bronchitis and/or emphysema
  - Enspryng (satralizumab) for the treatment of neuromyelitis optica spectrum disorder (NMOSD) in patients aged 12 years or older

# Coverage for insulin pumps

- NIHB provides coverage of insulin pumps and supplies for NIHB clients with type 1 diabetes. Prior approval is required
- Insulin pumps covered include:
  - YpsoPump (Ypsomed)

- o MINIMED 770, 670 and 630 (Medtronic)
- o t:slim X2 (Tandem)
- Full coverage criteria are noted in the Drug Benefit List

# Reminder: coverage for smoking cessation treatments

- Smoking cessation therapies are used to help people quit smoking. NIHB clients are eligible in a 12-month period for coverage of:
  - o Patches, gums, lozenges, inhalers or spray
  - Zyban 360 tablets per year
  - o Champix 330 tablets per year
- Some people need more than one form of treatment at a time to control cravings. NIHB will cover these products when used together, or separately
- Talk to your health care provider about the right product, or combination of products, that
  is best for you

- As of November 15, 2022, the eligibility for pediatric hearing aid warranties applies to clients under 18 years of age (a change from under 16 years of age previously)
- Find more information in section <u>2.1.5 Warranties</u> of the Audiology equipment and supplies benefits list. Your provider can confirm if you meet the criteria for warranty coverage

# Vision care benefit information

# Increased coverage for eye exams for clients 65 and older

- Starting January 1, 2023, clients age 65 and older are eligible for coverage of an eye
  exam every year, if the exam is not covered by a provincial or territorial health plan
- If your province or territory covers eye exams for seniors age 65 and older every two years, you may use NIHB coverage during the gap year
  - for example, if you are eligible for provincial coverage in 2022 and 2024, you can use NIHB coverage in 2023
- Contact your <u>NIHB regional office</u> if you have questions about your coverage for eye exams

# Mental health counselling benefit information

# Mental health telecounselling

- Many mental health counselling providers offer counselling services by phone or video call, and these services are covered by NIHB
- Your first session with a mental health counselling provider should generally be in person, so you and your provider can discuss a treatment plan and decide whether inperson or telecounselling is best for you
- Medical transportation support is available, if needed, to the nearest appropriate provider
- If you choose mental health telecounselling, NIHB recommends that you work with a
  provider whose office location would be eligible for medical transportation support in
  case you want to switch to in-person services
- More information on NIHB coverage of mental health telecounselling is available in <u>Appendix B of the Guide to mental health counselling benefits</u>

# Reminder: provider billing

- Many health benefit providers are enrolled with NIHB to bill the program directly for eligible benefits provided to NIHB clients
- NIHB recommends that before you receive any item or service, you should speak to your provider's office to confirm that:
  - o the provider is enrolled with NIHB and will bill the Program directly
  - the item or service is fully covered by NIHB
  - the provider will not charge you any additional fees
- Clients will need to know their NIHB <u>client identification</u> number, and share this with the provider's office so their provider can bill the program for the items or services provided
- If your provider does not bill NIHB directly, you can contact your <u>NIHB regional</u> office or the <u>Dental predetermination centre</u> (for dental or orthodontic services) for assistance to find an alternate provider

# CREATING YOUR OWN PERSONAL FAMILY TREE Using ancestryDNA

### JANUARY 2023(ON-GOING), HIFN HEALTH CENTRE/TRAILER #3

Gathering family history involves tracing a continuous line of descent from a given ancestor. In past times many First Nation people were taught to memorize their genealogy and this data was recited at marriages, funerals and at other feasts and ceremonies. Over time, the ability to trace one's ancestry by memory became a lost.

Today anyone wishing to trace his or her ancestry must search through vital statistical records such as births, marriages and deaths, and through various government and private records as well as ancestry research through on-line sites and DNA testing kits to obtain information on their own family lineage.

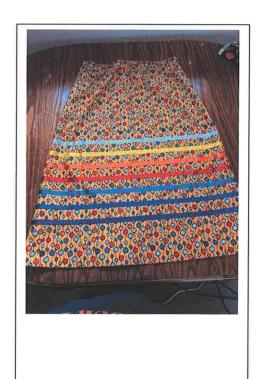
